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## Our Trail

Fourteen years ago I arrived at the time that we all know is coming: RETIREMENT. All kinds of thoughts come at that time. Will we have enough money? What will I do? Since I was married with grown children and grandchildren, will my wife and I drive each other crazy? (She had her own activities and interests and most of them were not mine and I had no interest in accompanying her to the grocery store or bridge club.) Like many of us I had a bucket



list and looked forward to working my way through it. To be honest, I had no hobbies and few friends that had not been associated with work.

We started in on the bucket list and made serious inroads in the first two years, We RVed our way to Alaska and the Maritimes and spent some time in the winter in Florida. We visited family (none were close) and all were busy with their own lives. All of these things were fun, we had enough money but significant amounts of time were still not occupied for me and I was still not interested in getting involved in my wife's activities. I also discovered that there is a lot of ego gratification in putting trail on the ground -- especially if it is done right. I went home bought a tent and a daypack and returned for another work party. What is more fun that a cold beer around a campfire after a day's work and a good meal? Pretty soon I knew a lot of the regulars and they knew me. Fortunately their expectations were low as to my work output so all was well.

I then wanted to have a piece of trail to call my own, so I became a maintainer and eventually a section supervisor. At some point during this first two- or three-year period, I realized that I had made real friends with many of the folks in this group and that we were sharing our good times and our bad times and that we cared about each other and what we were doing together. New people joined and others drifted away but it was always a very convival group.

An additional benefit of my work with the BTA has been that I get to see and learn a lot about other parts of the state. I am a native Ohioan, but there was much of it, I realized, that I hadn't seen. Canal towpaths, strange rivers and streams, old forts, new (to me) state parks, AEP Recreation Lands, and Muskingum Water Conservancy District and many other sites all became familiar.

Now age and physical limitations are forcing me to reduce and modify my activities but have not reduced the real delight I feel in seeing my BTA friends whenever I can. Thanks to all of you for giving my retirement a purpose and filling this period of my life with wonderful associations and memories.

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## Do You Want to Lose 12 of the Buckeye Trail's Best Miles?

That's the length of the Buckeye Trail in Burr Oak State Park, built and maintained by the BTA for 30 years. The Ohio Department of Natural Resources, Division of Parks and Recreation is seriously considering developing a 25-mile ATV trail system inside Burr Oak. This would be the first time ATVs are allowed in any Ohio State Park, and ODNR doesn't have a plan to share or a period of public comment planned. This system would intersect the Buckeye Trail, the North Country National Scenic Trail, American Discovery Trail, Burr Oak Backpack Loop Trail, the equestrian trail system, and day hiking trails such as those that lead visitors to Buckeye Cave. The proposal would cut right through a network of trails that when connected with the Wayne National Forest's Wildcat Hollow Trail create one of Ohio's few 40+ mile backpacking destinations. It would cross the floodplain of East Branch of Sunday Creek that feeds the lake, one of the few clean streams in the region not impacted by historic coal mining.

Public opinion does matter in the eyes of public officials. Protect 12 of the best miles of the Buckeye Trail that we helped to create and have taken care of for so long. Share your thoughts with the BTA, share your thoughts with your elected officials, and write a letter to ODNR:

This is an ideal trip for folks who want to get into backpacking, for those who haven't backpacked for years and want to get back out on the trail, or for testing new gear. This low-mileage, slow-paced trip will be ideal for you. About 7 miles of this trip uses the Buckeye Trail.

of the nicest hiking in the Miami Rivers region as we'll have several steep hills to get the heart rate up, historic sites to visit, and the beautiful Little Miami River valley as our constant companion.

From the parking lot we will head north on the Buckeye Trail for 0.7 miles, then duck into the woods on the white-blazed side trail. After winding back to the BT, we will head south, and have the option to climb into Fort Ancient and add 2 miles to our day. Those wanting to do 8 miles can keep heading south on the BT to Strout Road. Heading north, we will stop at the June Morgan Memorial and the Kern Effigies before recrossing the river to the parking lot. Total miles will be 8 or 10, depending on if you take the side trip into Fort Ancient.

Directions: Take I-71 to Exit 32, head south on Ohio 123, then turn left immediately onto Ohio 350. Drive 3 miles, and cross the bridge over the Little Miami. The entrance to the ODNR parking lot will be on the immediate right. Meet in this ODNR parking lot.

Wear hiking boots as some sections can be wet, bring plenty of water, and have something to snack on along the way. Post-hike, for those interested, will be at Doc's Place in Lebanon.

### **BTA Barn Directions**

Take I-77 south to US-250 east (just south of New Philadelphia). Follow US-250 past Tappan Dam almost to the end of the lake. There is a causeway with a sign that reads "Tappan Lake Park". Turn right (this road also takes you to Deersville). Approximately 3.1 miles from the US-250 turnoff is Beall Rd. on the right. Follow this dead-end road 1.3 mi. It ends at the BTA Barn down a long gravel driveway.

Remember the house side of the driveway is absolutely and strictly off-limits. It is a private residence so please respect their wishes and stay on our side of the driveway and please do not block any roads.



# On the Trail ...

Coming off of the first annual Buckeye TrailFest, the future of the Buckeye Trail seems bright. Thanks to the hard work of a devoted group of BTA volunteers we successfully hosted our largest annual gathering to date. You will see more details of the event here in the Trailblazer, but the take home message from Buckeye TrailFest was a new and renewed interest in all things Buckeye Trail. It was inspiring to see all of the activity, the fun,

the hikes, and especially the people.

There are many things to celebrate this season on and around Ohio's Buckeye Trail. The Ohio State House of Representatives and Governor Kasich have both publicly recognized the Buckeye Trail, the Governor taking a step further declaring April 26th, 2012 Buckeye Trail Day to honor the 45th anniversary of the designation of the BT as the State Trail of Ohio. Buckeye Trail membership has been steadily increasing thanks to the hard work of our membership volunteers. The BTA has re-launched our website with a new look and a few new features. Our Trailblazer magazine continues to receive great reviews from members and partners. The BTA signed up our very first workplace through EarthShare Ohio for employee payroll deductions, Add Ohio. Our Cartography Team has developed a new Hiker on the GO map series that highlights destination loop trails along the BT. With the success of our 2011 Member Challenge we are able to open a fund at the Columbus Foundation devoted to the long-term sustainability of the BTA. There is growing interest in southwest Ohio to form a new chapter of the BTA, tentatively name the Miami Rivers Chapter that would increase the local presence of the BTA. Our Buckeye Trail Crew continues to travel the state building and improving the BT with the potential of completing another multi-year project this May, over 20 miles in the AEP ReCreation Lands in Morgan and Noble Counties.

While there are many accomplishments and projects to celebrate, there are also several concerns. Most of the success we have been having is due to the increased investment of our existing volunteer staff and Trustees. Our volunteers are what make the BTA; while we try to show our appreciation as much as possible we are always competing for their time with life's other priorities. The more success the BTA enjoys, the greater the need we have for more volunteers to lighten the load, and many more volunteers for longer term administrative needs are desired. If you would like to lend your time and skills to the mission and vision of the Buckeye Trail please reach out to assist with some challenging yet rewarding volunteer work.

The BTA continues to succeed in negotiating for more of the BT to be relocated off of road walks and onto newly developed hiking trail and yet we are at risk of losing up to 12 miles of some of our best trail at Burr Oak State Park. The Ohio Department of Natural Resources Division of Parks and Recreation is planning on altering the park to include up to 25 miles of ATV trails that would cross, run along and be developed within the corridor of the shared BT, North Country National Scenic Trail and American Discovery Trail, as well as equestrian trails on the west side of Burr Oak Lake. This is a grave concern for the BTA. As most of you are well aware ATV use is incompatible, competitive and antagonistic to the vision of a primitive hiking trail. We are doing our best to stand up for Ohio's State Trail and our partners, not to mention the years of work the BTA has invested in building and maintaining the trail at Burr Oak. More information on how you can help protect the BT is available within the Trailblazer (see page 3) and on our website.

We have much to celebrate and enjoy, and yet we cannot take anything for granted. This time of year may be the busiest for hiking the BT and volunteering, thank you for both! As you pass by each blue blaze painted by your local volunteer trail adopter take a moment to appreciate our 53 year history, our status as the State Trail of Ohio and the route of our national trail partners. As you reach up to touch that blaze consider the amount of effort ahead to connect off road hiking trail segments together, to increase the use and awareness of the BT, and to protect what we have now. There is a growing community of Buckeye Trail enthusiasts; though you may enjoy the solitude by that blaze you are not alone on the Buckeye Trail. We have a lot of work to do together, but don't forget to celebrate our accomplishments and share your moments on the BT with others.

## 1st Annual Buckeye TrailFest

2012's Buckeye TrailFest was held April 26-29 at King's Domain Conference Center near Lebanon in southwest Ohio. TrailFest featured activities, presentations and workshops along with plenty of opportunities to network and socialize. King's Domain is on a hillside near the Buckeye Trail and Fort Ancient and close to a number of parks and ample hiking.

Keynote speakers included Mike Fanelli who presented "A Year to Wander the World," Andy "Captain Blue" Neikamp, who talked about his thru-hike of the BT last year, Bette Lou Higgins interpreting the history of Grandma Gatewood, and Jack Blosser from Fort Ancient who taught us about "The Indians of Fort Ancient".

Hikes included Caesar Creek State Park, Fort Ancient, birding and tree identification, Halls Creek Nature Preserve, and many hikes along our own Buckeye Trail! Workshops and hands-on sessions ranged from chainsaw safety to trail maintenance, to alcohol stoves, to the popular paracord survival bracelet (a bracelet you wear out hiking and if you need cord—say to lash something—and you can unravel your bracelet to have 10 to 15 feet of cord) table that seemed to be going all weekend.

Other speakers held sessions throughout the weekend: cooking, scouting, the BTA Barn, lightweight backpacking and even yoga. There were also speakers who talked of adventures on and off the Buckeye Trail, including "My First 42 Miles on the Appalachian Trail", "Hiking to Achieve Weight Loss Goals", and "Walking the Alps—1300 miles in 170 days". In total there were 46 different scheduled activities.

This event was also the Buckeye Trail Association Annual Meeting. Sessions were held with BT thru-hikers, board candidates, and Sunday morning was dedicated to BTA business, planning and awards.

Saturday night was the end of the silent auction, right after a well-attended wine and cheese reception that included music from the Mountain Dulcimer Society of Dayton. Later that evening a live auction helped raise additional money for the BTA. Three guided trips were on the block, as well as a Mystery Box, and the bidding was fast, furious and fun. Together the auctions raised close to \$4400.

Ice cream from southwest Ohio's Graeters and cake were served on Saturday evening by the Buckeye Trail thru-hikers.

The facility allowed camping on-site, as well as offering cabins and dormitory rooms. A number of people opted to tent camp, along with some car campers, RVs and even a car-top tent setup. Outside of some rain on Saturday the weather allowed for good camping and event participation.

The festival attracted 165 registered participants and set a recent history attendance record for a BTA event. Planning is already underway for the 2nd Annual Buckeye TrailFest and there will be plenty of volunteer opportunities to help with next year's event. The question is, can we top 2012? If we spread the word and work together, BTA can build on the groundwork that has already been done to keep this going year after year. Based on positive and positive comment, TrailFest is something BTA members would like to see every year!

## 2013 Buckeye TrailFest is April 25–28!

The 2013 Buckeye TrailFest will be showing off Lake and Geauga Counties. Penitentiary Glen Reservation in Kirtland will be reserving their entire facility to the Buckeye Trail Association Friday April 26, where we'll enjoy a cookout with all the fixings and a campfire afterward. After dinner, you will have your choice of hikes: either a rugged Gorge hike led by two volunteer naturalists, a hike on the trails to learn the history of the reservation, or your own self-guided hike. Tour the Kevin P. Clinton Wildlife Center and see rescued animals on the mend or in permanent residence, Kura the Red Fox and Artie the blind Great Blue Heron, just to name a few. Other planned events are in the works for the evening.

We will have bird hikes led by Lake Metroparks naturalists, interpretative hikes led by Lake Metroparks and Geauga Park naturalists and some led by Buckeye Trail hike leaders. There will be hikes of different lengths and terrain. We have over 110 miles of Buckeye Trail in our corner of the state, and we will cover as much as we can.

One of the activities already arranged is a tour of the Mormon settlement in Kirtland, founded by Joseph Smith in 1831. Tour the Kirtland Temple, then Chapin Forest (a Lake Metroparks reservation), with one of the local quarries that supplied the sandstone to build the Temple. See the tool marks where workers hand-cut the stone. You will know the full history by the end of this tour. Transportation will be provided by Lake Metroparks.

Holden Arboretum in Kirtland is a must-see and has its Arbor Day program that weekend. You don't want to miss walking here on your own or on a guided tour.

The Herb Society of America is located in Kirtland, founded in 1933 to expand the knowledge of herbs and their uses. We will attend a class at their 1841 building, learn about herbs and the history of the house and surrounding area.

The Geauga County Maple Festival will be happening at the same time at the square in Chardon. If you have never had a maple stir, now is your chance. We Chardonites consider the Maple Festival our kick-off to spring. You never know, we don't put our snow shovels away until mid May!

## A Series of Remarkable Experiences and Other Hiking Life Lessons

During my hunt for the trail on my first hike I read about a Buckeye Trail kiosk at Deer Lick Cave. I must have missed the kiosk, but there was a sign explaining the BT and at that point marks the convergence of three sections: Akron, Bedford and Medina. Officially I started the Bedford section today, but, alas, I didn't know it and without an actual BT map I got turned around right off the bat. With all this wandering around I've had plenty of time to come up with "clever" sayings for myself. Today's was, "The problem with traveling the road less traveled by is that sometimes you get lost." Hubby contested, "You get to know the path less traveled by, because you travel it twice!" Lesson #12 Listen to good advice the first time you hear it ... get the BT maps!

Leaving Deer Lick I headed east then north down into a valley and then up out of it toward Riverview Road. I was able to get all caught up in the early fall scenery taking photos of newly turned leaves that had fallen onto beds of moss, interesting plants with delicate strands poking out from within with little pearl-like flowers strung on them and trees with funny holes bored low on their trunks.

At the corner of Chippewa Creek and Riverview Roads, wondering the best way back to my car, all these kids kept pouring out from a hidden trail. I approached and asked one of them if he knew where he was, no, he was just following the crowd to a picnic. Walking up the line looking for an adult, one of the kids stopped and asked if I knew where their lunch was. Laughing, I told him no because I didn't know where I was! A few more kids came up to me staring intently at the bite valve and tubing from my Camelbak and inquired, "Is that one of those water backpacks?" Since it is tucked into a bigger hiking backpack it must have seemed ridiculously huge to them so I showed them how all of that worked. Finally an adult ran into me, a one-time BT hiker, who knew exactly where we all were, but couldn't recall where the BT went from here. I ended up walking with him and the last of the 7th graders to the Plateau Picnic Area, and from there, after saying my goodbyes, I kept heading back toward Deer Lick and my car asking joggers and walkers along the way for directions.

This was a short uneventful hike, thank heavens! I was wearing new boots and these long run-arounds over the last week were beginning to take their toll on my feet. *Lesson #13*: Never wear new shoes on long outings! Three hours later I got back to the car and decided to check out the next hike's section. I drove

At the request of the National Park Service, the Buckeye Trail is not blazed on the canal towpath, so watch for directions on signs! . . . and always carry a map back to and turned up Chippewa Creek Road and there behind this tall line of trees was the Brecksville RR Depot for the Cuyahoga Valley Scenic Railway! Now I know where all those 7th graders were coming from: they had come by train and were pouring out of the depot. As I parked the car in the station lot, Bill, an elderly gentleman, approached me asking if I was a park ranger. Dressed in dark green pants and orange scouting shirt, I thought I kind of looked like a park employee, but laughed that someone else actually thought so, too! He excitedly told me that he rode the CVSR and that before today had never been on a train of any type in his life! After we were done chatting it reminded me of my dad's advice: Lesson #14: If you listen for a while you're going to hear an interesting story. After looking over the lonely yellow station building I crossed the wrought iron Station Road Bridge to the towpath

I'd biked with the Scouts earlier this year. Although there were signs indicating the BT, I could find no blazes. I learned later that not all parks/paths permit blazing, but that usually there will be some sign indicating which way to go. *Lesson #15:* Be flexible. Be open to things not being the

Curious to know where the next blaze would appear, I got back in the car and followed the Ohio & Erie Canalway signs until I was back down alongside the towpath on Canal Road. I actually knew where I was there and there were blazes aplenty. Although I still did not have a clue which way was what, at least I knew that my next walk would find me along the canal

that was steeped in local and national history. I was really excited at what I would learn next to pass along to the Scouts.

## **Scouts Follow the Blue**

#### EAGLE SCOUT, THEN AND NOW

Though I have long forgotten their names, I will always remember the two men who inspired me in scouting and life. The first was the husband of my den mother: he was an engineer who often talked to us about having hobbies including collecting, having learned this from Albert Einstein (whom he had known). I went home that day and started a coin collection.

The second was my den leader in Webelos. Prior to this time, my den leaders had been the mothers of the Cub Scouts. When we advanced

in scouting, we had a male leader who taught us outdoor skills to prepare us for scouting. We learned knot tying and camping skills necessary for the Tender-foot badge in scouting.

My grandson is now 10 years old and Webolos age. The BSA has long insisted that the Cub Scouts are not a younger version of the Boy Scouts. Webolos use much of the same terminology as the older Scouts and can even wear the Boy Scout uniform instead of the Cub Scout blue shirt. They no longer use the Tenderfoot book I did when I was in the Webelos den in 1960. In 1960 our time with the Webelos den was 17% of the three-year Cub Scout program. My grandson will spend 33% of his time with his Webelos den.

The name WeBeLoS (for the ranks of Wolf, Bear, Lion Scout) dates back to start of Cub Scouts in 1930. It was the name of the made-up "tribe" to which the boys belonged. After the Lion rank was dropped in 1967, the name stands for "We'll Be Loyal Scouts."

Cub Scouts encourage parents to work closely with their sons as they earn advancements. As Cub Scouts progress they earn beads; with those beads, they receive the rank badge. Webelos mirror the Scouts more by earning activity badges prior to earning the Webelos rank. The Scouts choose badges according to their interests, with only a couple that are mandatory.

While Cub Scouts camp only as a pack with their parents, Webelos camp as much as possible to give them opportunities to earn the Outdoorsman, Naturalist, Forestry and Readyman badges. Most councils have a one- or two-night camp every summer.



Webelos start out in a den, then the den becomes a patrol. The adult den leader starts to turn control of the "patrol" over to the youth "patrol" leader, skills they will use in youth led troops in the Boy Scouts.

I look forward to walking the trails with my grandson's new Webelos den. Hopefully someday, a Scout leader will remember me as his Webelos den leader and prepare their son's or grandson's den to "Hike Ohio" on the Buckeye Trail.

## **Blazes On Their Trail to Eagle**

On June 12, 2010 I did my Eagle Scout Project. After exploring many options, I decided to do something on the Buckeye Trail. After discussing it with BTA Maintenance Supervisor Jim Sprague, I decided to build ten benches and place them on the Buckeye Trail near Defiance. I started by organizing a group and getting exact bench locations.

The appointed weekend, the Scouts I worked with and I built all the benches at the camp along the Auglaize River where we were staying. The benches we planned to place close to the road we built at camp and carried to their destinations. The benches we would place farther from the road we carried to their locations in pieces and assembled there. We built the benches from a blueprint that we found on the internet. Each bench took roughly 45 minutes to build because we had to cut the wood to the correct length, as well as assemble.

Once the benches were built, it took us roughly five hours to set them in their chosen places. Some of the places the whole group went together; others we split up into two groups so we could get the job done more efficiently. We secured the benches with a chain to an iron rod buried underground to prevent theft. Several months later, my father and I placed plaques on each bench. At that time all of the benches were still where we placed them. Sixteen people assisted me with the project, totaling 176 man-hours.

Since completing the project, I graduated high school and finished my freshman year at Ohio State University. My goal is to be a pilot; I have enjoyed aviation for as long as I can remember. I have earned my Private Pilot Certificate and am presently working to earn the Instrument Rating. Becoming an Eagle Scout truly helped shape who I am and prepared me for my future.

### SPECIAL REPORT ON BURR OAK ISSUES—ANDREW BASHAW

A lengthy letter has been sent to Glen Cobb, Acting Chief of Division Parks and Recreation at Ohio Department of Natural Resources, regarding the BTA's deep concern about the proposal to develop Burr Oak State Park into an ATV-focused park. The goal is to stay in communication with ODNR.

### GIS AND CARTOGRAPHY TEAM REPORT—RICHARD LUTZ

### Highlights of the BTA Board Meeting— April 29, 2012

#### NEW BUSINESS

- Byron Guy stressed the importance of getting others linked with the BTA Website. Adrian Vanko stated the importance of having reciprocal links.
- Steve Miller requested a budget increase to purchase hardware for permanent records storage on a server offsite. After some discussion approval was given.

### Highlights of the Annual Business Meeting— April 29, 2012

#### EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT— ANDREW BASHAW

- Clean Ohio Trail Funds hadn't been available during 2011, but \$6,000,000 is available in 2012.
- The possibility of ATV development in Burr Oak State Park
- So far more than \$35,000 had been donated to the Member Challenge Fund.
- Trail projects that have been completed included Strait Creek on Nature Conservancy property in the Sinking Springs section along with 20 miles of trail along the Miami Erie Canal Towpath in northwest Ohio. During 2012 the trail project in AEP Lands in southeastern Ohio will be completed.
- The Buckeye Trail project at West Branch State Park in northeastern Ohio is ongoing.
- Approval had just been given to move 14 miles of trail in southern Adams County to connect to Shawnee State Forest. This project will be started in the spring of 2013.
- Three Hiker To Go maps, including Fort Ancient, Burr Oak and Hocking Hills had been produced.
- The BTA Website had been updated.
  Andrew thanked the TrailFest Committee for all of their work and stated
- mittee for all of their work and stated that he had heard many comments about how the Trailblazer looked very professional. Andrew's focus in 2012 will be fundraising and financial management.

Richard Lutz is an AmeriCorps volunteer working with the BTA under Andrew. Richard works with Rory Robinson from the Cuyahoga Valley National Park to upgrade the BTA volunteer program. He is also working on forming BTA chapters.

#### TRAIL MANAGEMENT-PAT HAYES

As the interim chairman of the Trail Management Team, Pat stated that the main priority is to find someone to take the position of State Trail Coordinator.

#### NEW BUSINESS

Rory Robinson reported that the Cuyahoga Valley National Park is in the process of making a Comprehensive Trail Management Plan. Public meetings to get input will be held in June and July.

#### OLD BUSINESS

- Connie Pond introduced Linda Paul from EarthShare, which provides people the alternative to give to environmental organizations through their workplace giving. In turn the BTA receives funds through EarthShare. If anyone knows of a possible company, they should get the name of the company to Linda.
