President's Message

It's almost time to relegate 2017 to the books and it was a busy year for the Buckeye Trail and the Buckeye Trail Association. Progress was made in almost all areas of BTA endeavors and it was all due to the hard work of volunteers and staff.

By the time that vou read this, the BTA will likely have signed

two agreements with the Muskingum Watershed Conservancy District. One of these agreements will convey ownership of the BTA Barn, the Beall (pronounced bell) Farmhouse (pictured) and other adjacent structures that are near Tappan Lake in Harrison County to the Buckeye Trail Association. The other agreement will enlarge our current lease area to approximately 10 acres and allow the BTA a certain level of autonomy to develop them for the benefit of our organization. Our prior arrangement with MWCD was for the lease of the BTA Barn and we had no ownership.

Lots of trail maintenance and some new trail construction took place this past season as well. With a



new effort for the chapters to begin developing regional trail crews to help build and maintain the trails in their own areas, capacity to keep the overall Buckeye Trail maintained has been enhanced. Chapters that are working to build their own trail maintaining and building capacities include the Muskingum Lakes and the Crooked River Chapters. In September, the Buckeye Trail Crew worked with the Muskingum Lakes Chapter trail crew (known also as the Muskingum Masters of Mayhem) to rebench and clear a portion of the Buckeye Trail near Clendening Lake in the Bowerston Section. The BTA political effort continues to build momentum. The Ohio Trails Partnership, with the BTA as a founding member, is instrumental in working with the Ohio Department of Natural Resources to develop a statewide map of all official hiking, horseback, mountain biking, water and multi-use trails. The Buckeye Trail is already on this map and the little blue line going around the perimeter of Ohio is the biggest trail feature on it. This map is expected to be largely complete by the middle of 2018. Its creation was suggested by State Senator Sean O'Brien, founding chairman of the Ohio Legislative Trails Caucus back in May. ODNR, in recognizing the coming importance of trails and the rising influence of the Ohio Legislative Trails Caucus, has designated Tom Arbour as the first State Land and Water Trails Coordinator.

The first ever Caucus Hike took place in early October. Although it was not on the Buckeye Trail, 5 BTA members joined 4 state legislators and one dog on a two day hike in Northeast Ohio. Caucus Co-Chairs Senators Sean O'Brien and Steve Wilson joined Representatives Kent Smith and John Patterson on the Western Reserve Greenway in Ashtabula County amid some beautiful fall scenery (see picture). BTA members were the primary organizers of this hike and it looks like it will be repeated in another part of the state next year, hopefully on the





Buckeye Trail this next time.

By the time that you read this, it's also possible that the Senate Resolution designating "2018, the Year of the Trails" will have been passed by that legislative body. The BTA is planning to have several events in 2018 celebrating that resolution.

Although there's lots to be grateful for, we do have some concerns. There are 26 miles of the Buckeye Trail in the AEP ReCreation Lands that could be in jeopardy. This is being watched closely by staff and volunteers. It requires vigilance and effort on the part of volunteers and staff to be on the watch for any local changes that could affect the Buckeye Trail in their area. In short, the work of the Buckeye Trail is never done and we should enjoy the hiking and the work whenever we can. I hope to see you out there on the Buckeye Trail doing one or the other.

One unexciting task that I recently found a moment of joy in was cleaning and organizing the BTA office in Shawnee. From all the work your staff does, all the volunteers popping in to pick up and drop off special event materials, all the orders of brochures, the mud tracked in by visiting school groups, a lot of mess is created throughout the busy seasons. I came across several stashes of paper I had set aside, gifts of documents to the BTA from families with historic ties to the beginnings of the BT. Cleaning the office goes really slowly when I'm paging through original correspondences and meeting minutes of a small group of devoted volunteers who were trying to figure everything out.

From 1959 and through the 1960's, the handwritten and mimeographed letters of encouragement and differing opinions between Bill Price, Merle Marietta, Grandma Gatewood, Ralph Regula, Merrill Gilfillan, Bill Miller, and Bob Paton are a window into the thinking of the time and remind me of BTA volunteer leaders and partners of today. One thing I notice – these letters were much more articulate than my emails or Trailblazer articles today. The spirit of optimism and persistence in the face of insurmountable challenges that our founders displayed continues to be contagious. The messages from the past are a humbling reminder how far back our partnerships with agencies such as ODNR and MWCD go, and how intertwined our history is with groups like the Ohio Horseman's Council, Cleveland Hiking Club, the Ohio & Erie Canalway Coalition and many others.

I can't help but notice the many efforts the first members of the BTA (about 80 in 1960) struggled with in their day are ones that we continue to struggle with today. Not enough members and volunteers, mixed results on key landowner negotiations, the price of membership (\$3 per person in 1960), how to better promote the trail to the people of Ohio... with an anticipation that with the correct strategy the challenge can be overcome in short order. Well, most of those challenges seem to persist... and yet, look at all the progress of six decades of hard work!

Given this little insight into what this enthusiastic group of volunteers were thinking and feeling in that first decade, I think that they would be very proud to see your BTA today. Proud to see the Buckeye Trail Crew creating and improving hiking experiences, proud to see our progress in permanently preserving parts of the BT corridor as they conceived it, proud at the growth in hikers and membership and their continued engagement in volunteerism all around Ohio. I think they would be especially proud that the BT, even with great partnerships, is driven by everyday Ohioans who give an exceptional amount of their time, skills, and effort.

It is some comfort to realize that the challenges may not go away, but that we can 'enjoy the moment' as Jim Sprague kindly reminds me from time to time. Enjoy the moment when we succeed on connecting trail segments during a Buckeye Trail Crew Work Party. Enjoy the moment when a new campsite on the BT is created. Enjoy the moment when the BT gains a new member surrounded by fellow hikers at Buckeye TrailFest. Enjoy the moment when another acre is preserved for the trail. Enjoy the moment when another hiker publicly aspires to complete the entire BT or a group of kids rounds the bend on a path through the woods that may not have existed before 1959. Enjoy the moment daydreaming about getting away from it all while you are cleaning the office, because you know the BT is out there waiting for you when you need it.

Before these treasured letters make their way to the BTA archives at the Ohio History Center, I'm glad I got a glimpse to share with you of a few who came before us who tromped through the thickets of Ohio imagining that someday people like us could be rounding the bend on a BT hike. I don't know if they grasped how much more work a generation of BTA volunteers would devote to the idea they helped to develop.

During this holiday season I want to thank you for all your generous support of the BT. The most important gift we can really offer as a group back to any individual is the opportunity for great moments all around the state on the BT. And I think, that is the best our founding members could have hoped for.






